FAITH IN ACTION TEAM 2018 YEAR END REPORT

The Faith In Action Team members include Shelly Lee, JoEllen Uptegraw, Lana Dyreson, Kailey Langdon, Peggy Jones, Megan Mieden, Alycia Hathaway and Pastor Jim.

The purpose of this team is to encourage the education and faith enrichment of the congregation and community. This past year we offered a number of activities, including:

Holy Moly serves Pre-K through 4th grade students and is led by Megan Mieden and Alycia Hathaway. Along with the help of Amy Hearne and Katie Barrios, they focus on teaching our young ones various stories from the bible. Pastor Jim relates his children's sermon to the lesson they will work on that particular day.

Bridge is offered for students in grades 5 and 6 and is led by Alycia Hathaway, Liz Taylor, Craig Johnson and Pastor Jim. Utilizing small groups and activities, they have focused on the stories of the Old Testament.

The confirmation program consists of 7th graders and 8th graders. The Confirmation Leaders are Jeff Reese, Gregg Guenther, Mel Markhardt, Danielle Moyer, Anne Forbes and Pastor Jim. The focus is to prepare our youth for their life faith journey. Instruction includes small group sessions as well as whole group settings. Second year confirmands went on a retreat in December to Bethel Horizons. It is a wonderful bonding, spiritual experience for our youth.

Vacation Bible School was coordinated by Alycia Hathaway, Melanie Norton, Shayla Danz and Amy Hearne. They used their strengths and talents to cover all the aspects of offering a

successful week long event for our community's children. The theme of the week was "Jesus Changes Everything." This followed the theme of the Houston Youth Gathering. Thank you to all the volunteers who housed, provided meals and otherwise entertained the Sugar Creek counselors. Lots of people were involved in order to make for such a successful program. We want to thank Wendy Uphoff for her work as coordinator in previous years.

CHAOS (Christ Has All Our Solutions) continues to meet the fourth Sunday afternoon of each month and is open to all community high schoolers. It has seen growth this second year. Some members of the group attended the Houston Gathering. Meetings include playing games and just enjoying fellowship with each other. Pastor Jim is present to encourage discussion and provide spiritual assistance as needed.

Game Day continues. Attendance has grown significantly. Those participating meet on the third Friday of each month. This is for anyone in the community. A light lunch is provided by different volunteers each month. Lunch is followed by numerous game offerings. Laughter and conversation abounds. The group voted to keep meeting through the winter going forward.



Book Club continued this past year. We read three books and gathered for discussion and fellowship. One of the books we read was Reawakenings by Barb Mangi. Mrs. Mangi then attended our church and conducted a discussion about her book following worship. It was so meaningful for us all. We also watched the film version of another of the books The Shack that was quite moving as well. Two more movies were shown and were well received. Additionally, we offered "A Charlie Brown Christmas" to jumpstart the Christmas season and it was very well attended.

We continued to facilitate the *Progressive Dinner* this year. One was held in February and another in July. Our host families have been very gracious. We hope to continue this type of offering and are working to introduce new host families. People sign up to attend (they pay for the cost of the dinner). We divide those who signed up into groups (in no particular order) to have dinner with a host family. It is a wonderful way to meet people we only see in church and to reconnect. Again this year, the dinner was followed by a fire pit at the Bowe retreat which was wonderful! Thanks to all who participated.

Lana Dyreson coordinated a trip to American Players Theater again this year. Lana is given a limited number of reduced cost tickets by A.P.T. She shares those with her church family. We had just an absolutely fabulous time. Thanks Lana.

Amy Hearne coordinated a *bible study* on the book of John. This was an inspiring, informal and informative way of looking at the bible and moving forward. There are plans to create a time for the women of our church family to gather for faith and fellowship the 3rd Friday of each month.

BLC sent a group of youth and adults to the ELCA Youth Gathering in Houston this past June. Pastor Jim accompanied the group as they worshiped, prayed, served and immersed themselves in a week-long inspiring faith adventure!



We discussed introducing a talent show to our congregation. There are a couple of people we have contacted to help on a planning committee. We are looking for more ideas, more planners, TALENT and people who want to make a difference. We hope to have this performance in April. We will continue all the initiatives discussed above because they work! We welcome people who want to help us to make a difference as well as any ideas and thoughts.

Holy Moly! 2018 Annual Report

We are in our third year of using the Holy Moly! curriculum and the kids are excited to scream "HOLY MOLY" every week!!! We recruited two new additions to help out as we entered into the fall school year – Amy Hearne and Katie Barrios. We continue to meet regularly to discuss the upcoming lessons and prepare the materials for teaching the kids.

Our enrollment increased again this year! We have nearly 50 kids enrolled with 25-30 kids in regular attendance each week. We continue to meet each Sunday following communion but have extended our meeting time until about 10:45 am.

Each week we focus on a different lesson, and each lesson is broken down into 4 components – Discover, Relate, Connect, and Create. We start out in our classrooms (Pre-K – Kindergarten, I^{st} – 2^{nd} , and 3^{rd} – 4^{th}) to discuss the week's lesson, then we all move to the Theater Room for the video. Following the video, we separate back to our rooms to discuss what we saw. In our rooms we also read the story from the Bible and work on the lesson's project.

We held our annual Breakfast with Jesus celebration and served the entire congregation a breakfast meal following worship. Our Christmas Program was coordinated by Cindy Reeson, Shayla Danz, and Melanie Norton; the Bridge students also participated in the program. 
The Year in Review:

Barneveld Area Community Food Pantry- 2018

The Barneveld Area Food Pantry is a cooperative outreach of the Barneveld and Ridgeway churches, local organizations and private donors. Located in the Barneveld Lutheran Church, 505 Swiss Lane, (608-924-8621), it offers a variety of dry goods, eggs, bread and frozen meat.

Through December of 2018, families made 511 visits to the pantry. Fortunately, our community – from children to senior citizens - again put great energy into collecting food and money for the pantry. Consequently, we have been able to keep pace with our neighbors' need for assistance. Thanks to everyone's generosity, we have received almost three tons of goods from the community. We have also purchased more than a ton of items from retail stores and have bought nearly three tons of food from the 2nd Harvest Food Bank of Southern Wisconsin.

Pantry Shopping: The pantry is open Wednesdays from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and by appointment. It has no residency or income-level restrictions, but clients may visit only twice a month, but we do not turn anyone in need away.

Depending on family size, a client may take home one to three bags of food. Clients fill their bags with whatever shelved dry goods they wish. Staff provides eggs, bread and frozen meat.

<u>Staff</u>: Marcia Thompson, the Lutheran church office manager, oversees the pantry. Volunteers, including Judie and Lowell Gibbon, Elsa Greene, Becky Stauffer and Jan Stoltz, shop at cost-effective vendors, especially Second Harvest Food, bank, weigh and sort food donations, and stock shelves. Additional volunteers help sort and store items collected in large food drives, and they are very much appreciated.

Special Contributions: During their Annual Trick or Treating for the Hungry, Barneveld Lutheran Church young people collected 2,009 pounds of donations from throughout the village In December, the Barneveld school staged a carnival created by the middle school students for kids in the elementary school that annually raised \$2,734 for the pantry.

Food Drives and Fundraising: The pantry benefited from three major food drives this year. Prior to the Halloween collection, the US postal service collected 1,080 pounds of food in May. In December, Miller & Sons – Mt. Horeb, will be giving the pantry many dozens of food-filled grocery bags donated by their customers for area pantries. Many other local organizations, including the Congregational and Catholic churches, the Barneveld Library, Quantum Devices, the annual holiday craft fair and Circle Sanctuary, also collect food for the pantry.

The pantry relies on local food collections to supply items prized by our clients that are seldom or never available from Second Harvest. The pantry especially welcomes donations of sugar, flour, canned fruit, canned pasta, diced tomatoes, boxed cereals, creamed soups (other than tomato), shampoo, laundry soap, bath soap, baby wipes and toilet paper.

Besides food and hygiene items, the pantry welcomes cash donations. Money goes a long way at the Second Harvest Food Bank. The pantry can buy cases of dry goods there at greatly reduced prices, frozen meat costs only 18 cents a pound, and loaves of sliced bread are free.

Thank you to each and every one who has supported the Barneveld Area Food Pantry in some

way throughout the past year. We can all be proud to be part of a community willing to share our blessings with those who happen to be struggling at the current time. We never know what circumstances may lead us to be on the receiving end at some time in our lives.
