Lutherans don't talk a whole lot about covenants (Presbyterians seem to use covenantal language more often); but covenants are biblically significant. Our Old Testament

readings for most of the Sundays in Lent this year highlight covenants God makes with various groups ranging from all creation, to the Israelites, to Abraham and Sarah.

The first Sunday in Lent highlights the Noahic covenant: the promise God makes to Noah, his descendants, and all creation that never again shall there be a flood to wipe out the earth.

The second Sunday in Lent emphasizes the covenant God made with Abraham and Sarah. God promises Abraham: "You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations." (Gen. 17:4b) And God promises Sarah will be blessed and: "she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her." (Gen. 17:16b)

The third Sunday in Lent we hear of God's gift of the Ten Commandments; God's life-giving law which instructs the people of Israel with how to live in covenant with God.

And the fifth Sunday in Lent we hear about God's promise of "a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah." (Jer. 31:31b) Here God promises: "I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people." (Jer. 31:33b)

You may have noticed in the above paragraph I skipped the fourth Sunday in Lent! The Old Testament reading for this day comes from the book of Numbers. It is the story of poisonous snakes that bite and kill many Israelites. Moses intercedes for the Israelites with a prayer to God and God instructs Moses to make a bronze serpent and affix it to a pole. "So Moses made a serpent of bronze,

and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live." While there isn't a specific covenant given, there is a promise. God's covenants include promises (which God never breaks!)

The term "cutting a covenant" comes from the practice of cutting an animal in half and then each party of the covenant walking between the cut pieces. The idea here is that the covenant is so serious that if either member breaks their end of the covenant, they should be cut in half like the animal they are walking between. In Genesis, God represented by "a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces." (Gen. 15:17b) when God made the covenant with Abram (his name will change to Abraham later).

While God never breaks a promise, we regularly (daily) break our promises to God. So, God sends us a Son who never disobeys God's will. Jesus, lifted high on the cross, becomes our salvation much like the bronze serpent on the pole saved the poisoned Israelites. "For our sake [God] made [Jesus] to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." (2 Cor. 5:21)

While Lutherans don't use covenantal language often, we do speak of God's promises. In this Lenten season we can give thanks for God's promise of salvation as it comes to us through Jesus the Christ. As we journey through Lent may we look to the cross of Christ; remembering: "O Lord, once lifted on the glorious tree, as thou hast promised, draw us all to thee." (Lift High the Cross #660 in Evangelical Lutheran Worship).

**For week 4,** consider making a heart:

draw it on a piece of paper, cut out a heart shape, make something out of cloth, clay, wood, or some other medium. Personalize it anyway you'd like. Don't forget



to put your name on it somewhere and if you want you can add this verse from Deuteronomy: "If there is among you anyone in need, a member of your community in any of your towns within the land that the LORD your God is giving you, do not be hard-hearted or tight-fisted toward your needy neighbor." (Deut. 15:7)
