Pastor's Pen

"Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD. LORD, hear my voice!" (Psalm I30:I). When we, or loved ones, experience tragic events in life, we make these words of the Psalmist our own. It is a normal human reaction to ask: "Why? Why did this happen to me?" or "Why did this happen to my loved one?" But ultimately any answer we might receive to such questions is unsatisfying. Even if we know "why" a 4yr old child died (for example, from cancer); this doesn't change the fact that this small, unfulfilled life has come to an end! Knowledge doesn't undo the power of tragedy and death. Even worse, in our attempts to explain the unexplainable, we can assign "reasons" or "causes" for accidents and tragedies that do more harm than good!

Remember Job and his three friends? "Now when Job's three friends heard of all these troubles that had come upon him, each of them set out from his home....They met together to go and console and comfort him. When they saw him from a distance, they did not recognize him, and they raised their voices and wept aloud....They sat with him on the ground seven days and seven nights, and no one spoke a word to him, for they saw that his suffering was very great." (See Job 2:11-13).

When someone is living through a tragic life event, sometimes the best thing to do is just sit with them quietly; just be present. Showing up as a sign of support, is far more productive than trying "to help" the one suffering come up with an answer as to "Why?" this all happened. Job's friends do well at the beginning of the story, but when they try to problem-solve his suffering, things don't go so well. Sometimes we want to blame others, or ourselves, or even God, for our suffering. Sometimes we unfairly attribute someone's condition to sin: "His disciples asked him, 'Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?' Jesus answered, 'Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him." (John 9:2-3).

Job never gets a clear answer as to "why" he undergoes the suffering he does. Ultimately, God the Creator, knows some things that we, the created, simply don't understand. This can be frustrating when our human nature is to quest after understanding; especially when we believe that knowing "why" can alleviate our suffering. What God does reveal to humanity is: God's love in a personal and relatable way through Jesus Christ! Through the incarnation, through God entering into humanity and experiencing our betrayal, suffering, pain, and ultimately death, God joins us in full solidarity. God relates to our suffering; because God has experienced it personally in Jesus! But there's only so much comfort in knowing that the Captain of the Titanic goes down with the ship! If that's all to the story, it's still tragic. This is where the resurrection speaks a word of hope. Because God refuses to let pain, suffering, and death have the final word; because ultimately God is the God of life, we place our hope in the God who has the power to raise the dead to new life! The God of resurrection.

The first Sunday in November we recognize All Saints and the last Sunday this month we begin Advent. With All Saints we will give voice to our hope in the God who restores us to relationship with loved ones now separated from us through death. And with Advent we will prepare to welcome the God who enters our humanity as Emmanuel (God With Us). The God who experiences all our humanity, life and death, and everything in-between. The God who, through Jesus Christ, promises us life on the other side of death! For this the Psalmists plea: "Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD." Becomes: "O come, O Branch of Jesse, free your own from Satan's tyranny; from depths of hell your people save, and give them vict'ry o'er the grave." (O Come, O Come, Emmanuel Hymn #257, v. 4 in Evangelical Lutheran Worship).

God's life-giving blessings to you this November! Pr. Erich In the book of Acts we hear: "All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need." (Acts 2:44-45).

Monthly Health Tip

RECIPE OF THE MONTH from Ronda Bowe

Butternut Squash Soup

- 2 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- I large yellow onion chopped
- I/2 tsp sea salt
- I (3-pound) butternut squash peeled, seeded and cubed
- 3 garlic cloves, chopped
- I Tbsp chopped fresh sage
- I/2 Tbsp minced fresh rosemary
- I tsp grated fresh ginger
- 3 to 4 cups vegetable broth
- Freshly ground black pepper

Heat the oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add the onion, salt, and several grains of fresh pepper and sauté until soft, 5 to 8 minutes. Add the squash and cook until it begins to soften, stirring occasionally, for 8 to 10 minutes.

Add the garlic, sage, rosemary, and ginger. Stir and cook 30 seconds to 1 minute, until fragrant, then add 3 cups of the broth. Bring to a boil, cover, and reduce heat to a simmer. Cook until the squash is tender, 20 to 30 minutes.

Let cool slightly and pour the soup into a blender, working in batches if necessary, and blend until smooth. If your soup is too thick, add up to I cup more broth and blend. Season to taste and serve with parsley or crusty bread.
